

Doug Hagaman Memorial Fly

Back in September 2003 David Robinson of the White Horse Kite Flyers in England called me to say the Martin Croxton had suggested they have a memorial fly for Doug Hagaman. Martin reminded club members it was going to be 10 years since Doug died. For those who are unaware of Doug Hagaman: he was a master Parafoil maker who, over many years, perfected that form of kite. "Great idea" I said agreeing with David. Then the subject of having a pin for everyone who fly's their parafoil came up. "Great idea" I say again. So naturally I volunteered for the job. While working on the pin and not paying much attention to anything else Sylvia Bernauer of the Washington Kitefliers Association read an article in the White Horse Kite Flyers newsletter about the Doug Hagaman Memorial Fly. She too thought having a memorial fly on the same day would be great. So with Sylvia's organization, Marla's phone calling and pins ready to go we waited anxiously for Dec. 14th. The day arrived and as Doug would have it, the skies cleared of predicted rain, the temperature dropped, the sun peaked out and the wind blew. Boy, did it blow. The wind can be too strong for a parafoil and this was the day. Many of us went ahead and launched our kites but they did not stay up long. The wind speed was approximately 30 mph. We had about 26 people, 16 or 17 Hagaman parafoils and a special treat of Doug's mother bringing her small parafoil to fly that Doug had made for her. Due to the wind chill factor we took the group photo, passed out the pins and shared some special stories about Doug. Sonny Hamner and Ken Tumminia drove up from Oregon on Saturday and back on Sunday just for this fly. Well, maybe Sonny did it for the too. I won't share photos and dialog about Sonny's wind tubes and trees. Just ask him next time you see him. The White Horse Kite Flyers in England had light wind and very cold weather. They managed to fly 13 parafoils that day. Stretch Tucker in Florida waited all day for the rain to stop to fly his. No luck! The Lehigh Valley Kite Society in Pennsylvania braved very cold temperatures and snow to fly their club parafoil. All in all it turned out to be a successful Memorial fly with Doug's mother bewildered that this many people after 10 years still thought of Doug. CRUMBS FROM THE HICHAIR


I will not dwell on the sad loss of Madge whom we all loved dearly. She will be missed by us all and our heart felt sympathy goes to Janet and David.

Possible formation of a British Kite Flying Association.

For some time now, there has been a feeling amongst some kiteflyers that we need a national body to represent us. In order to test this idea, Jerry Swift (Secretary of the MKF) called a meeting to discuss the matter. This was held at the Risley Park Hotel, near Sandiacre, Notts on Sunday 9th November 2003.Some 50 people attended the meeting. Jerry Swift opened it by welcoming everyone, particularly those who had travelled so far. People from North East, from Brighton, from the North West, from Avon in the West Country, from Wiltshire and from 10 minutes down the road. He also noted that it was Remembrance Sunday and the meeting paused for one minute's silence. As he was acting as meeting secretary Jerry said that he would prefer somebody else to chair it and nominated George Webster. There being no other nominations, George agreed to chair. George then outlined how the meeting would run. He identified the proposition to be debated.

Proposition

"That this meeting believes that the time is right to form a national, elected body to represent all U.K. kitefliers. This meeting supports the election of a working group of UK kitefliers to develop a constitution for such a body, in consultation with existing UK kite flying organisations and requires the working party to report back in 6 months time, at which time this meeting will agree whether to proceed or not. If the decision is taken to proceed, the meeting at that time will elect the first governing council, chairman and such other officers as the working group shall identify as necessary."

Jerry Swift opened the discussion with some general remarks: He noted that are many diverse groups – KSGB, PKA, BBC and all the clubs ranging from a few 10's of members to MKF, WHKF and others with maybe 1000 members. None would claim to represent all kite fliers.

Some issues have been identified with the nearest we have to a national body for single/two line fliers – KSGB. They produce a national magazine but are not elected and as such cannot be said to reflect us all. That said, we mustn't underestimate the contribution and the effort that Gill & Jon put in, and it is the only national magazine we have.

All this diversity is against a background of increasing regulation, increasing interest and sometimes opposition from local authorities, Health & Safety Executive and other regulators. Insurance is also becoming increasingly difficult, particularly for smaller clubs. So against these sort of issues we note that there is greater strength if we all get together - that's why this initiative was started some 15 months ago leading to today's meeting.

But this must be viewed against the risk of some big clubs dominating the issues, a risk of only representing part of the kite flying community and excluding, say, the power kiters; and the need to balance all aspects of our sport and hobby. And the ultimate contradiction: we all do this for fun, we do it to get away from work, from politics, from hassle. But organising a national body is just that, hassle. Jerry then précised correspondence he had received, ranging from negative through neutral to positive.

There followed a discussion with many contributions and points raised.

Some people felt that a national body was essential to give us the power to deal with the increasing burden of restrictions and regulations that may affect the future of our hobby. Others felt that a national body would conflict with the aims of local clubs and possibly "take them over". There was also some concern over the possible provision of national insurance for kiteflyers. Some club representatives said that this could destroy their clubs, as a large number of members join solely to get the benefit of club arranged insurance. There was also some discussion as to whether membership should be "individual" or through club affiliation. At the end of the discussion, George proposed a vote on the proposition, seconded by John Larson.

It was carried with 48 in favour, none against and one abstention. There was a proposition that a steering committee is formed with representatives from every club present at the meeting. This was not intended to give every club a "vote", but more a convenient way of ensuring a good geographical spread of working party members and ensuring that no particular club could dominate. The Clubs were identified as: White Horse Kite Fliers, Hereford Kitefliers, ELF, Golden Valley, MKF, Brighton Kite Fliers, Avon Kitefliers, Thorpe Kitefliers, North East Kite Fliers. Also agreed should invite KSGB, STACK, BBC, PKA. Committee should also consider inviting other large groups such as Northern Kite Group, Great Ouse Kitefliers and the Manja Club. A list of representatives was drawn up and with that, the meeting closed.

My name was put forward as the member from WHKF.

Please note, that at this stage, all that has been agreed is to set up a working party to investigate the viability of a National Kiting Body.

This working party will canvass opinion and look into the establishment of such a body. It may conclude that it is not needed, or not viable. If however, it is felt that we need a national body, then we must look into the role of the organisation, its objectives, terms of reference, constitution, etc.

In order to do this work, we need as much input as we can get from ALL kiteflyers, whatever their particular interest in the hobby.

OKR (Oregon Kite Retreat) Totem Pole Class

This invite came about via a phone call to Roy on his mobile while he was in the pub! It was a class previously taught at Fort Warden (in America) a couple of years ago, so this made it easy.

The class started at 9am, with 15 students full of enthusiasm. The kite kits were distributed to the students (all kite makers or kite fliers). Each person had a template of the kite, then two extra colours for all the panels. We also took spare colours for those who wanted to vary the design (which most of them did). Roy explained the first few steps of the design and they all got down to work-in between chatting and catching up on what everyone had been up to since we last saw them.

Rather than sewing, the design is mainly stuck using double-sided tape, then the panels cut out using a normal appliqué technique.

The class began in silence, but people soon got the hang of things, and were nattering between themselves, asking us questions if they got stuck. The time passed quickly and before we knew it, it was time to stop for lunch. By this stage, there were some interesting designs starting to appear.

This is a Kite maker's conference, and a lot of kite makers from all over the world are invited to share their various skills, making it a very interesting 3 days. The "sticking" rather than sewing is a slow process, requiring patience and getting it right first time. It was new to virtually all the students, who seemed to get on okay, although a bit frustrating for some, as it is time consuming before actually seeing results.

After lunch, more sticking and cutting continued for about an hour or so, then the process moved on to the next stage of sewing on the pockets and hemming around the edge of the kite. Lots more questions this time, but they all got it right. By 4pm, we knew we'd be coming back after dinner! The class re-started at 6.45pm, and carried on and on! Lots more chatting this time, but by midnight (!) they had all virtually finished their Totem Pole kites, an impressive collection.

Kite Flying Safety Tips

The NEVERS of Kite Flying

- Fly a kite in wet or stormy weather, try to keep your kite line dry.
- Fly a kite near power lines, transmission towers or aerials.
- Fly a kite with wire or anything metallic in the line.
- Fly a strong pulling kite without wearing GLOVES.
- Leave odd bits of flying line etc on the flying site.Fly a kite at over 200 feet*.
- *Kite festivals may have C.A.A. clearance to fly higher.....ASK!

The Things to AVOID

- Motorways, roads, car parks railway lines or buildings.
- Airfields and low flying air traffic patterns.
- Members of the public....stunt flyers please take care!
- Those kite eating trees.
- Animals, they can be frightened by kites. Remember...your kites can get really quite lonely up high in the sky, just occasionally, look up and give them a little SMILE.
